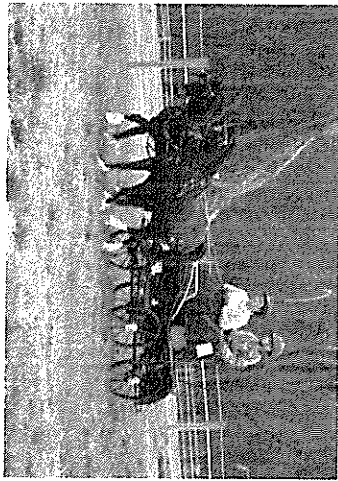
Delaware Foreign annual renewal is due. As our insurance covers our liability at all our events, it was decided to not renew this plan.

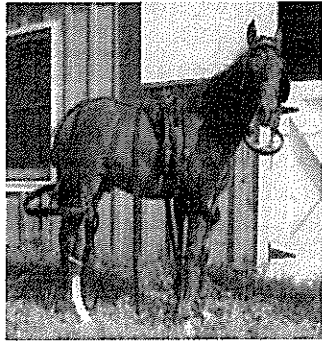

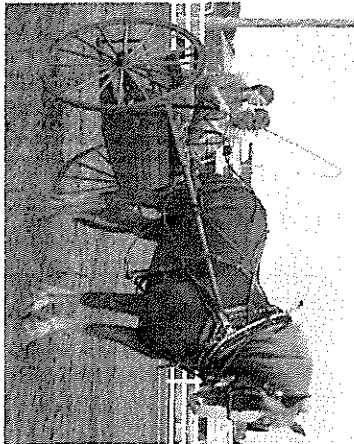

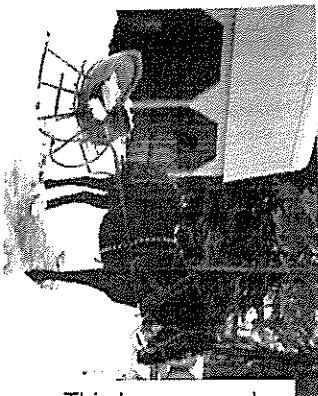

## Safety Column by Martha MacDonald

If you've read this newsletter, you know the Board is seriously concerned about safety while driving. We don't want to be police but we do want to remind all our members that driving is a dangerous sport and we all need to be alert and attentive when we hitch our beloved horse/s to a cart and head out for a drive.

We've decided to start a 'Safety Column' where we talk about events that might have been prevented by some careful planning or actions to prevent an accident. Please send me your story...what happened and how it might have been avoided. If we don't listen to history, we are doomed to repeat it.

For this first episode, I'd like to report an event I saw happen with my own eyes.

About 2 years ago I was at an event where a fellow was

laying down a terrific cones course when his extra long reins fell out of the cart, got entangled in the wheel and the right wheel locked up. The horse was thrown into a very very tight circle and fortunately halted quietly.

Dangerous event....extra long reins with no control of the reins.

Smart resolution: 1. Make sure your reins are buckled together. (after you get into the cart/carriage)

2. Attach a small piece of yarn to the buckle and fit it over your little finger so the reins can't fall away from your hands. The yarn will break if you are thrown from the cart.

3. If your reins are really long, coil them up and sit on them. Don't let the extra length fall onto the floor of your cart, risking falling out and getting entangled in

your wheels.

Sometimes a very simple action can prevent a truly horrible accident. What if the horse hadn't halted? What if the driver had been thrown from the cart? What if the horse had bolted and caused further accidents, including a crash that could have destroyed his driving career? Please take the simple steps to keep an accident from happening. We are driving for the joy. Don't let preventable accidents happen.

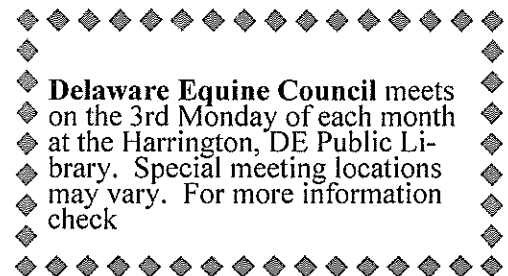

## Trip to Gloria Austin's Florida Carriage Museum

In early March Anna Klumpp and I flew down to Florida for the CAA's Driver Proficiency Program for 6 sunny, warm days. I went not so much for the driver proficiency program, but to take some four in hand lessons/coaching lessons from John Parker, an expert from England. Anna went for the evaluator's program. John canceled a couple of weeks before the program and the man who was going to take his place for my lessons was called home early so I never did get my team lessons. Instead I took a couple of what I thought were boring single horse lessons to help me get closer to my level 2 designation. I also was Anna's student for a simple rein board lesson. I never did finish my level 2 designation that week end which was disappointing until I can home and imple-

mented with my own horses what I learned in those single horse lessons with Andy Marcoux and again on the rein board with Anna and Andy. It just blows my mind what a difference it's made with my team of four horses. See I never took much time with single horse driving. I've been LUCKY as I started driving with a very patient older school master horse who was so tolerant of my mistakes, then I moved up another patient pair of older mares. I've been very blessed with some very good horses who have taught us and been very forgiving. It's really been awesome to watch the horses lighten up and soften in my hands with such simple basic driving. Want to learn more? Here's my advice: If you have ever wanted to go to Gloria Austin's Florida Carriage Museum in Weirsdale, Florida

- Don't wait— go! You can rent horses there and take lessons and stay right on the 400 acre property or nearby in a hotel.
- Take some lessons and learn the coachman's one handed style of driving even if you don't use it all the time. It frees your right hand to hold the whip.
- Take some of the Driver Proficiency Program. It will be offered in our area during the ADS Mid-Atlantic week end in Fair Hill in August. This program is new and not intended to be a pass/fail situation, but rather a "keep coming back until you get it right and move up a few levels program" Don't expect to pass right away at Level 2, like you might at Level 1

## Horses Meet Wheels by Martha MacDonald

Inspired by an article in a driving magazine, several TEC/Delmarva Driving Club members decided to offer a clinic for the local riding club to introduce their horses to driving horses and carts/carriages. The Tuckahoe Equestrian Center was a 3 day camping and trail riding gathering of nearly 50 horses and riders. DDC folks arrived around 9 AM and set up 3 stages. First horses could touch and taste a stationary cart. Some horses were fearless or bored but others had a few squeals and snuffles. Second stage was to meet a quiet horse attached to a cart.

Again this stage was met with essentially boredom by the horses. Then the fun began. Carol Seiler had her hackney pony, Martha MacDonald had her mini and Karen Mack had her Morgan. Knowing that many horses can't understand mini's, we felt that was an important aspect of the introduction process. First the horses walked around the hitched carts, then followed behind. At one point there was a parade of the mini in full working trot and half a dozen gaited horses gliding along behind. So far so good. But when we turned around and horses had to be ap-

proached by the moving cart or were to trot past the moving cart, some horses expressed grave concern, including scooting sideways, running backwards or trying to bolt. All drivers accepted the requests of the riders to repeat actions, take them slower and eventually add bells to the hitches to increase the noise level. Two and a half hours later, there were a lot of happy riders, quiet horses and an opportunity to share our passion for driving.

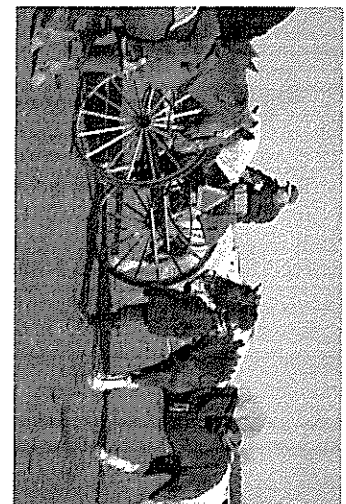
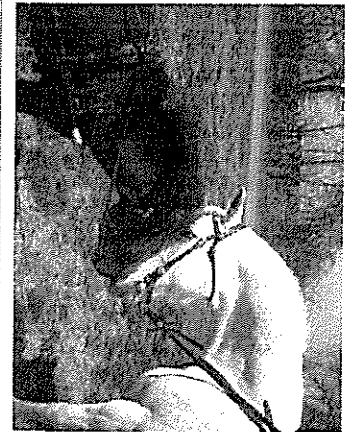
gathering. Camping is available with or without electricity hookup.

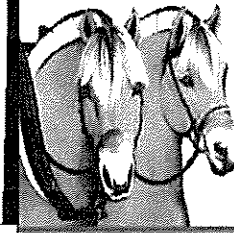

# *ADS Carriage Driving Trail Guide*

## Some great ideas from the ADS

### SAFETY TIPS

NEVER take the bridle off while the horse is still attached to the vehicle-not even when he or she has a halter under the bridle,

NEVER leave your horse unattended while your horse is still tied to your trailer if still hitched to a carriage,

TEACH your horse to 'WHOA' and 'STAND' before leaving your home barn,

MAKE sure your breeching is properly adjusted and check for harness wear and vehicle soundness. Do a hand test on carriage bolts to see if the bolts are tight,

CONSIDER using a gullet strap or braid your horses mane/forelock into your bridle to prevent easy removal by a rubbing sweaty head, (Always carry a lead rope and halter in case you need help)

The LAW requires (in most states) a SLOW MOVING VEHICLE sign if driving on public roads, visible from 3 ft off the ground, (for VSE drivers, consider a flag from your vehicle since you sit so low to the ground)

CARRY a fully charged cell phone on your person,

CARRY a whip. It 'replaces' your riding legs, (Try and keep it in your hand and not in the holder :-p),

DRIVER is always first in and last out of the vehicle,

STAY ON marked trails. Avoid hunting season, (or where hunting ORANGE)

NOXIOUS PLANTS are everywhere, don't let your horse nibble along the way,

LIGHT to DARK areas are hard for a horses eyes to adjust, go slowly during this transition,

DESCEND steep grades slowly,

CROSS bridges with care,

MEETING a rider requires caution and courtesy. Stop the carriage and allow the rider to determine how to pass safely,

CALL OUT when passing another carriage, USE Road hand signs,

DRIVE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE LANE. Look for places to get off the road safely,

WEAR reflective road clothing/vests, (assume you are invisible to cars and hunters)

*HAVE A GREAT TIME!*
