A DDC Board Meeting was held on January 6, 2022 and new Board Members were welcomed. The minutes from meetings on November 4th and December 11, 2021 were approved as submitted. The Treasury report had a starting balance of \$7,707.62. Expenses totaled \$125.00 and deposits were \$860.00, leaving an ending balance of \$8442.62. An annual Treasury Audit will be completed by March 1, 2022. The report was accepted as presented.

The proposed Club budget for 2022 was presented and after a discussion it was determined the budget will require amending since the Club is considering some new merchandise. Michele Brauning will evaluate the existing inventory, make a proposal regarding adding a wider variety of items, and present it at the Maryland Horse Council and this expense will also need to be added to the Budget. Plans for the May 14th Show are moving along. The show committee has determined that there will be no "In Hand" class for the 2022 show and the registration fees for classes will be as follows: \$10 per class for preentries and \$15 per class the day of the show. Junior Drivers participate for free. It has been suggested that an awards ceremony for champion and reserve champion ribbons be scheduled 30 minutes after the last class is completed. The Prize List for the Show is now available. Please contact Pam Gray for a copy. All club members are encouraged to solicit advertising and sponsorships. These forms are now available on the DDC web page and will be available in the next several newsletters.

As always volunteers are needed and welcomed. Please contact Show Manager Pam Gray at 410-819-6113 or pgray59@hughes.net if you would like to help with the Show Committee. The Board reviewed the Club By-Laws and it was suggested to change the term of the DDC officers to two years rather than one. This could include staggering the terms. This change must be voted on by the general membership. However the by-laws were approved as as they stand until the next General Membership meeting.

Since Covid continues to make in person events more difficult, the Board decided to utilize our Zoom account to help keep members engaged and informed. Other clubs have had great success with these informal chats with time for questions. Possible topics include: horse photography, new careers for retired racehorses, nutrition for older equines, etc.


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Refining Your Turnout Program was an Overwhelming Success

On Saturday, January 15th, the Delmarva Driving Club Driving demonstrated just how versatile and complex carriage driving can be. From one July weekend in 1983, this club has grown from seven charter members getting together for an overnight pleasure drive to a large group with diverse interests and backgrounds. Frances and Wayne Baker showcased these interests by hosting a "Refining Your Turnout" program at their Hollyville Farm in Harbeson, DE. Club Members were able to see, touch, and interact with different turnouts and equipment used in such disciplines as: Competitive Driving, Commercial Driving, Pleasure Showing, Coaching, and even what to wear to a driving lesson. The highlight of the day was a coaching horn demonstration by Rich O'Donnell. This fantastic exhibition showed how the coach horn is used to announce a coach or act as a communication system. It also entertained the passengers. Each call is authentic and carries a message like: we have arrived, get ready and let's go, we need lodging, or

even I'm thirsty. Rich brought 5 different horns and showed the great skill needed to play while standing on a moving carriage. He also wore a traditional Guard uniform, explaining the difference between the winter and summer uniform as well as how to properly shine the Beaver Hat. (He also explained why the uniform was red and how all the components of the outfit had a specific purpose – thick half chaps to protect his legs from the wheels, heavy gloves for protection, and even his tie could be used as a tourniquet if needed). Other Club members knowledgeable in different driving disciplines shared their thoughts and equipment. John Layton's hackney pony has helped him cultivate his interest in Competitive Driving, so John shared his safety equipment including his protective driving vest, helmet, and marathon clothing. Linda Thomas has been a Commercial Carriage driver since 1989 and she showed various attire worn to participate in weddings and

funerals. She also showed how commercial harness has a lot more 'bling' and embellishments than pleasure or competition harness. George Parris shared





Mendyka Park Drag which were displayed side by side. The Brewster has been presented at The Devon Horse Show in Pennsylvania, won the 2017 Carriage Association of America Sidney Latham Award in Lexington, Kentucky (this award is given for the best antique vehicle over 30 years old still in use), and participated in the Coaching Weekend in Newport, Rhode Island in 2018. The Bakers had several friends and family members dressed for coaching. Even their two year old granddaughter, Mayvis, participated and showed great interest in the coaches. Hopefully she will be a future Coaching Whip (driver). Her grooms were attired in suits with Bowler hats, while the Full Livery was displayed on mannequins next to the Park Drag. The Park Drag's rear boot showed an array of refreshments that would have been served during a stop. At the end of the presentation, several of the attendees even 'climbed up' on the Coach for the exposure to the impressive vehicle and a couple of folks attempted to 'tootle'. Thank you Frances and Wayne for hosting this informative way to share how great this sport is.

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

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

What is the Horse Council and How can it Help You? By Stan Vonasek

The American Horse Council formed in the late 1960s and by 1970 they became the Coalition of State Horse Councils with 43 states participating. Now they lobby before Congress and Federal agencies for the interests of the horse industry and they serve as a unified voice for the horse industry. Both Maryland and Delaware have State Equine Councils which represent, educate, and connect all segments of their State horse industries.

The Delmarva Driving Club has been a member and supporter of the Delaware Equine Council for many years and have been entitled to the many benefits of DEC membership. Besides receiving an informative DEC Newsletter six times, you automatically gain some of the benefits of membership in the American Horse Council as well as gain access to discounts on liability insurance, rental cars, marketing tools, communication tools, etc.

Recently the DDC Board voted to join the Maryland Horse Council where their core mission is to lobby state and local government for sensible and economically sound positions, and to provide educational and business networking resources for the Maryland horse community. The MHC publishes a free monthly publication called *The Equiery*, which provides the Maryland horse community with horse industry news, educational articles, photos, and profiles on horse businesses and horse people, as well as a service directory for businesses that serve the Maryland horse industry. 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Winter Barn Ventilation Guide

Resist the urge to close up the barn during cold weather

Closing even a few barn doors and windows to make the barn warm and "cozy" can cause a significant decline in air quality as dust and other particulates build up in the air. A horse with heaves will be especially sensitive to this, but any horse can be adversely affected if kept in a tightly closed space.



To avoid wintertime ventilation mistakes, remember that it's wind and precipitation you are shielding the horses from—not cold air. Horses don't mind the cold as much as we do. Plus, a blanket can provide the extra warmth a horse needs without putting his respiratory health at risk.

Your barn isn't well ventilated if:



The temperature inside is more than 10 degrees higher than the barn outside



You can detect the odor of ammonia. (This also means your stall-cleaning effort needs work.)



Condensation forms on the inside of windows or other surfaces

Remember...

Most healthy, unclipped horses can live outside comfortably in sub-zero temperatures with only a windbreak shelter and plenty of hay.



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Protect your horse from wind and precipiation

If it's not windy or raining or snowing, leave all the barn doors and windows open—no matter the temperature. If wind and precipitation are a concern, close only those openings necessary to block them, which typically means windows and doors on the windward side.
