# **Barn Hacks**

Here are a few ideas to help make your life easier:



1. Use a tire rim as a hose holder to make the most awkward horse barn chore of rolling the hose up easier. Better yet, get some of those shrinking hoses that you have seen on TV ads – they are amazing and save so much time and hassle.

2. Use a loofah glove for deep cleaning some of your horse's tack. This is great for nubby reins that accumulate a lot of goop and the rough side of the harness. Be careful if your tack is super smooth, as you may scratch it. You can also use these to clean buckets and bits and anything else that needs some grip and texture. Also good for the wash rack for dirty equines.

3. Use a brush attachment in your screw gun to deep-clean buckets, feeders, troughs, trailers, stall walls – you name it.

4. Aloe vera gel. Great for human and equine sunburns, as well as scrapes, cuts, abrasions.

- 5. Use a fair amount of detangler product on your horse after a bath and before a clip. This makes your clipper blades glide through the hair. You can also use a grooming oil.
- 6. Use old clipper blades to shorten a mane. Backcomb the hair and use the old clipper blade to chop off the end of the hair. Some clipper blades can only be sharpened once or twice, then they can live on in your grooming kit as a mane tool.

## Grazing Muzzles—What is the Right One for Your Equine

Many horse owners are looking to limit the amount of grass their animals are able to consume, yet, they still need or want their horses to roam free in the pasture all day. I am going to share advice from my experience in using several different types of these muzzles on my different size equines, over the last 30 years.

Most of the muzzles come either already attached to a halter from the manufacturer or ready to attach to your own halter. I prefer the attached kind. If you are going to be attaching one to your own halter, I strongly advise using a designated halter with the muzzle attached for turn out only. Be sure to attach the muzzle firmly to that halter because they are not supposed to be easy to remove. Always use a separate halter for grooming and other everyday uses.



The first type of muzzle is the old style standard grazing muzzle. It's made of

heavy black nylon with a thick rubber bottom with a 1" hole. These are hot because of the color and not very easy to breathe in. As we live in a hot and humid climate, horses do not like the tiny hole and will usually do all they can to get it off, or not let you put that thing on after a while. Now there are newer styles of this muzzle with large holes in the nostril areas for easier breathing. There is also a slightly larger hole for grazing. This makes the animal feel less restricted and desperate.

There are also muzzles that say they have an adjustable hole size. It's not going to take your animal long to figure out how to open it to the larger size. Save your money - Buy another style the first time.



Not vet recommended are the style of muzzle with the aluminum metal bars on the bottom like a grate. The metal gets hot and the animals are very likely to injure their teeth on the metal. Or chew through it, possibly consuming the metal and then cutting themselves on it. The grate is also too open and allows too much grass to be consumed at once, hence defeating its purpose.

There is (in my opinion) an excellent type of muzzle called a Greenguard muzzle. Made by Greenguard Equine.com, it is different looking than other types of muzzles you may have seen before. The material is very durable and will last for several seasons. It comes in numerous colors. I always like a bright color, so at a glance across the field, I can tell it's still on

and in the right position. I have had great success with this type of muzzle. Especially when compared to wasting my time, effort and money on the other types of heavier muzzles or muzzles that make my animals angry and combative in trying to put them on (because they were so frustrated with the heat, lack of air and inability to eat any grass). The horse will just beat the muzzle on the water trough till they break it.



The Greenguard muzzle has a great website and customer support. They come in 3 sizes: mini, pony and horse. They will help you find the correct size for your equine and have advice, and videos to keep it fitting correctly for even the most crafty Houdini.
