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Dreams Come True at the 2020 National Standardbred Show in New Jersey

We all have goals or a Bucket List, but the best part is when someone we know accomplishes an item on their list. John and Colleen Layton share a passion for anything equine. For years, they have both ridden and driven all types of horses and ponies. The story below is about one of their most recent challenges. Even though the end result was not their original plan, it was absolutely successful. This year long effort took a Team, but it was worth it



as the story shows – acquiring a retired Standardbred racehorse to driving in the 2020 National Standardbred Show. Their memories and friendships will last a lifetime and their Tailgate Parties are now becoming lengendary! Congratulations John and Colleen Layton on your success with Miss Cora!

The Story: So I love driving the Hackney ponies with all their movement, but they are just not big enough for both Colleen and I to ride in the cart/carriage. I was always trying to find the right Marathon carriage and then trying to fix the man made problems that came with them from the Hackney Show World. I got to thinking that if we started with a baby, we could do everything the way we wanted to eliminate these issues. So I thought it would be great to start with a big Standardbred mare and breed her to a Dutch Harness horse in order to get the stable temperament of the Standardbred and the movement of the DHH. Colleen and I agreed to give it a try. We have a great friend that came to the US from Denmark about 30 years ago as a Standardbred groom. We've always talked about the training techniques in Denmark as compared to the US, which I find very interesting. We told her our idea and that we were looking for a big mare with a stable temperament. Since our friend still has a lot of connections with race horse trainers, she discovered a mare within 10 days that might meet our needs. We went 'to look her over' and saw a big, beautiful 16h mare named Cora Louise! I wanted to see her move, so we took her out to the paddock and let her go. She had a huge trot, an arched neck, and her tail cranked over her back – she was just beautiful. She actually ran right at me and veered away at the last minute to test me and I liked that. She was foaled in 2008, had 4 wins with \$35,000 in earnings, and a career marked time of 1:57.3. She was retired and became a broodmare producing 4 foals, one of which is racing now. So we took her. Fast forward

a couple of weeks — we looked at a couple of DHH Stallions and I found one that I loved in PA. When we had her vet checked, she required treatment for a uterine infection (it wasn't a cheap treatment but the result was good). After daily vet checks for ovulation, Colleen and I were finally able to pick up the semen and we bred her. We waited the 18 days and nothing showed. The vet cultured her again and this time a different uterine infection was discovered, so we decided not to

breed her again, but would start driving her. On 8/8/2019 we began taking lessons with Suzy Stafford and Miss Cora made good progress. However we had some issues with her just wanting to trot all the time, speeding up when you

pulled in the reins, and wanting to race everything that was near her! A lot of time was spent working on those issues!. In November, we took her to Pam Kister's Grey Horse Stables to participate in a Gettysburg drive. We drove cones, the obstacles, and the trail drive around her farm. The first time we

had a stream crossing she jumped it (she was hooked to the marathon carriage). On the last day we went on the drive at Gettysburg Park. There were 8 carriages and we started out at the end. We drove to the park road and that was all she needed - 7 horses in front of her and a big grey road that looked like a race track! She was really a handful that day and we ended up passing everyone and basically driving by ourselves. At one point we even passed a tour bus – you should have seen the look on those people's faces. After we got home I learned about the National Standardbred Show and my new training goal was to show there in 2020. We put in a lot of hours driving and driving cones which she loves. But the only vehicle that I had for her was a marathon carriage. Luckily we train with an awesome group that included Mike and Dawn Pontz - we trained every week all year long! They had a gig that was too big for their horses, but the shafts were too short for

Cora. So I bought the gig because it was gorgeous. I simply put new curved shafts on the vehicle to

fit her and it came out beautifully. Since I only had a synthetic, every day harness, I borrowed a leather and brass harness from the Pontz's as well as a Holly whip. Another problem we had to overcome was Miss Cora is the pickiest eater that we have ever had. Colleen had the hard job of keeping her looking good with special care and diet. Cora had stomach issues and was always belching and groaning. She would also get very hot and it would be hard to get her respirations down. Colleen fixed that by finally getting her to eat a different diet (Poulin feed supplemented by Purina Outlast for the stomach issues and natural Vitamin E from DAC and alfalfa at lunch). This did the trick and fixed all of these issues. Finally the day of the Show arrived and it was raining! The classes got moved into the Indoor Arena – Miss Cora had never been in an indoor before. But we walked her around in there to get



her used to the loud speaker and the rain on the roof and she adjusted fine. All went well and it was a great day! In fact John and Cora won Best Turnout, both of the Obstacle Classes, resulting in Champion of the Obstacle Division, and placed in 3 Pleasure Driving Classes!

A Sporting Day of Traditional Driving

The DDC will be holding A Sporting Day of Traditional Driving event on Saturday, September 26th at the farm of Frances and Wayne Baker in Harbeson, Delaware. A Sporting Day of Traditional Driving is the American version of the popular European Internationale d'Attelage de Tradition. This event was set up to celebrate the bygone days of driving. During the day, you will be judged on horsemanship, good judgment, and quick decision making while driving. Your turnout will also be judged on the pride you have taken in presenting (cleanliness, etc.) your carriage, the suitability of your harness, and of course good sportsmanship.

Your day of driving is comprised of three sections:

First is the Turnout Inspection: you will be judged on the cleanliness, safety, and the general overall impression that you, your harness, your carriage, your horse and any other person that is in your carriage. Any type of rein handling (one or two hands) is allowed as long as it matches the type of vehicle that you are driving. Your harness should be suitable for the type of carriage you are driving and be in good working order. It should be of a proper weight for the carriage and have the proper collar and saddle as needed. Synthetic or leather is allowed but leather is more preferred as it is the traditional type that was used with all antique carriages. You will be judged at the halt as well as on the move. Horses or ponies must be clean and well groomed with no boots or bandages allowed. All types of carriages or carts are allowed but antiques or reproductions are preferred. If lamps are carried they must be of the proper type and in working condition. In this part of the Traditional Day of Driving you can earn up to 50 points.

Second is the Country Drive: in this phase you will be showing your ability to drive safely in a variety of situations. All rules of the road are to be observed. The driver is allowed to walk, trot and halt his horse at will. However you will need to keep your horse at a steady pace to be able to complete the course in the allotted time. The distance will be 4 miles. The course will include ten (10) simple driving tests along the way. The course will also include course gates so that all drivers are sure to go the same distance. All types of equine are allowed to participate at a speed set forth for their type of equine (horse, pony, miniature). You start the drive with 25 points and then points are deducted any failed driver's test, for not completing the course in the required time and not going through a mandatory gate. Judging is based on an honor system as you bring (or are) your own Judge.

Third is the Cones Course: this is a demonstration of the driver's ability to drive through a set of cones at the proper speed and without hitting any of them. You only need to complete within the required time allowed. The cones are driven at a trot and there are 6 sets of cones. The width of the cones will vary from 18" to 24" wider than the axle width of the vehicles. The speed allowed will depend on the type of equine being driven. You again will start with 25 points and deductions will be taken for balls down, cantering, exceeding time allowed, going out of order and failing to go through a set of cones.

Even though a Sporting Day of Traditional Driving does contain competitive elements, each turnout is competing against an ideal, rather than against the other turnouts. If this sounds like something you would be interested in, register by completing the attached form on the next page and return them to:



On August 8th Martin Auctioneers presided over the sale of these unique vehicles. Many DDC Members came out just to view the collection, as there may never be one like it again. The best part of the Sale is that several carriages and accessories have found a new life. One of the pieces was the Georgetown Silver Cornet Band



Wagon which was even featured at the opening of the Carriage Museum at The Museums at Stony Brook around 1951. So it is fitting that the Georgetown Silver Cornet Band Wagon was purchased by Frances and Wayne Baker, who then generously

donated it to the Nutter Marvel Museum in Georgetown, DE. This is wonderful as this vehicle just needed to stay local!



Sixteen vehicles were purchased by John Allegra from Allegra Farm in Colchester, Connecticut and these vehicles will be used in the Movie and TV Industry! Mr. Allegra has provided carriages and horses for

countless movies over the decades. The most recent movie was Little Women which was released in December, 2019.
